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Action taken report with reference to the Annual Report and the Resolutions placed at the 220th AGM held on Saturday, 28th September 2024

I. ACTION TAKEN REPORT

There is no action to be taken on the Annual Report.

II. COMPLIANCE WITH THE RESOLUTIONS PLACED AT THE PREVIOUS 220th AGM HELD ON 28th SEPTEMBER 2024, WHICH WERE PLACED UNDER AGENDA ITEM NO.7

Proposed Resolution (From the Managing Committee):

A.1 Resolution No.7.A.1:

The resolution No.7.A.1 moved in the 220th AGM, for confirming the Honorary Fellowships of the Society on distinguished persons, was unanimously passed by the General Body.

Dr. Maneesha Tikekar declined due to personal reasons.

Whereas, the office of Mr. Anand Mahindra conveyed appreciation for the award to Mr. Anand Mahindra (for his contribution to the field of Industry and Art). However, since Mr. Mahindra was currently not in India, they requested that he be excused from accepting the award this year.

B. Proposed Resolution (From Members):

The following resolutions submitted by the members before the General Body Meeting for

B.1 Resolution No.7B.1:

The resolution No.7.B.1, proposed by Mr. Pulind Samant and Mr. Manoj V. Kulkarni, moved in the 220th AGM, (that in view of the current precarious financial condition of the Society as well as in view of the lack of suitable options, and also with a view to secure the future of the Asiatic Society of Mumbai for future generations, the Managing Committee of ASM must approach the Government of India, through the Governor of Maharashtra, who is a Patron of ASM by virtue of the position, for securing the status of 'Institute of National Importance' for ASM, at the earliest) was accepted by the General Body.

The matter of taking steps to declare the Asiatic Society of Mumbai as an Institution of National Importance had been pursued over the years. As no response had been received, with a certain sense of disillusionment, it was not pursued in this year.

B.2 Resolution No.7B.2:

The resolution No. 7B.2, proposed by A.V. Gopalakrishnan and seconded by Chirag Dighe (that the members be given an option to borrow books through courier service on payment basis) being a good suggestion, was accepted by the General Body.

However, it was not implemented, as no demand for this facility had been made.

President's Message

The time has come for me to bid goodbye to all of you. As I look back on the six years that I have been the President of the ASM, and before that the six years as the Hon. Secretary, I can legitimately claim that the Asiatic Society has been an integral part of my daily existence. I have worked closely with many of the office-bearers, and together we have ensured that the activities of the Society are well managed and given their due publicity. This has resulted in an excellent response, not only from members, but also from the public who have turned up in good number for our evening programmes. Several of our sub-committees have worked towards achieving this goal. Particular mention in this regard must be made of the Mumbai Research Centre, the Endowment Committee, the Lit Club, and the Book Selection Committee.

I think we might have done even better if we did not have to face some negativity from our own members. I fail to understand what such negativity hoped to achieve. It certainly did nothing for the Asiatic Society. Surely it should be the responsibility of every member to ensure that the Society prospers. And if we have survived for 221 years, then every member should consider it their duty to ensure that it continues to survive with dignity and aplomb.

We are fortunate that the majority of the Staff have contributed towards this goal. Our AO, Mr Nitin Patil, has given the lead in the right direction. Unfortunately, paucity of finances has caused some heartburn. And for those of us at the helm of affairs paying the staff salaries has been a constant struggle. We have not given up in our efforts to get the Ministry of Culture, Government of India, to increase the annual grant that we have been receiving. And we were hopeful that this year we would meet with some success. But, again, the negative comments and criticism from some members, which were actually forwarded to the Ministry, dampened this expectation. Once again, it was the Society that lost out.

A singular achievement of our Hon. Secretary, Dr Mangala Sirdeshpande, and Vice President, Dr Shehernaz Nalwalla, was to persuade the Government of Maharashtra and the BMC to sanction an annual grant to the Asiatic Society. None of the earlier Office Bearers had been able to achieve this. Unfortunately, one of the conditions made by the Government of Maharashtra while sanctioning this grant was that it should not be used towards payment of salaries. This was a sad blow indeed.

In conclusion, I appeal to those who will take charge of the Asiatic Society, to continue in the efforts to increase our financial status. I repeat what I had stated last year. We need to reach out to philanthropists, like-minded organisations, and the public at large who care for books, research, and libraries, to support a culture-specific organisation like ours.

THE ASIATIC SOCIETY OF MUMBAI ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR 2024-2025

1. HIGHLIGHTS OFTHEYEAR

- Prof. Bhalchandra Mungekar was unanimously elected as the Chairperson of the Board of Trustees. All members congratulated him on his appointment.
- We welcome the new Trustees Mr. Akil Kureshi (retired Chief Justice of the High Court of Rajasthan and Tripura) and Prof. Dilip Nachane, noted academician.
- Two officers were deputed by the Ministry of Culture to look into the issues of the Asiatic Society of Mumbai. The Officers were informed that the Society is in dire need for an increase of Annual Grant, or Corpus Grant. Once the increase in Grant is received from the Ministry of Culture, Government of India, the Government of Maharashtra could be asked for a matching increase.
- Shri Vikas Kharage, IAS, Principal Secretary to the Chief Minister, Government of Maharashtra, visited the Society on 14th May 2024. After his visit, the Society had sent a letter dated 15th May 2024 bringing to his notice the paucity of funds for the day-to-day management of the Society.
- A commemorative coin to mark the 350th anniversary of Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj's coronation was presented to Ms. Madhavi Kamat by the Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj Vastu Sangrahalaya (CSMVS) where Ms. Kamat is the ASM Representative. She in turn presented the coin to the Society.
- Mr. Harish Shah became a Donor Member of the Society.

- 5.2 Library Digitization Project Phase II:

Microfilming / Digitization, Manuscripts, Rare Books and Maps Section:

During the year, 2,489 books were digitized under the Library Digitization Project. Further 4,768 books were checked for quality.

Researchers/Scholars referred to the digitized/microfilmed material from the Special Collection Room for their research purpose. The Microfilming / Digitization Department has given 1142 microfilm printouts/soft copies to researchers (members / non-members) on payment.

5.3 Dr. Aroon Tikekar Centre for Advanced Studies:

The annual function of the Tikekar Centre was held in the Durbar Hall on 1 February 2025. Reputed Historian and Professor at Centre for Studies in Social Sciences, Dr. Prachi Deshpande was the chief guest. She spoke on "Scripting the History of Language".

ABSTRACT: Usually, we think of language history in two ways: a chronological story of its literature from the earliest text to the present, or the way it evolved within a language family over centuries. Scripts are usually seen as technical instruments for writing language, or as symbols of identity. Can a focus on the relationship between scripts, language, and writing, give us insights into how, where, and by whom a language was used, and how people thought about language in different ways? In this talk she focused on the cursive Modi script, which was used to write business documents in Marathi for several centuries, to chart a history of Marathi usage and users over the last few hundred years. Through the example of Modi and Marathi, she spoke about changing attitudes and practices of language in Maharashtra and beyond, such as literacy and orality, documentation and archiving, multilinguality, and linguistic identity.

On the day, the current Fellow Mr. Aslam Saiyad presented the work so far caried out for his subject "Cultural & Religious Festivals of Adivasis of Palghar District through sociological and economic lenses". He has sought an extension and is expected to complete his work and submit his final dissertation during the year 2025-26.

Mr. Elloit Cardozo was announced as the selected candidate to pursue **Tikekar Fellowship for 2025 - 26.** The title of his project is "The linguistic remixing of Bambaiyya into Rap". He could not attend the function.

The college lecture series held in colleges across Mumbai and Mumbai Metropolitan Region continued this year too. This year's series continued with a new subject titled "Eating out in Mumbai." One lecture was held at Wilson College, featuring Dr. Mohasina Mukadam as the speaker. The response from students was overwhelmingly positive.

Dr Aroon Tikekar Centre hopes to continue the research and knowledge dissemination work it has done so far and augment it in other ways in the coming years.

The Research, Scholarship & Medals Committee finalised the modalities of pursuing research, for the scholars and the guidelines for the Committee, in the latter half of 2024. Due to its decision to combine the years of fellowship to augment more funds for each scholarship, many candidates had applied for the Research Scholarships of the year 2024-25. The Committee scrutinised the proposals and shortlisted the suitable candidates for an interview. It then interviewed and selected seven candidates as recipients of various scholarships.

The Committee conducted the six-monthly viva for the three scholars who were selected for the year 2023-24. It gave detailed suggestions to the candidates to successfully complete their research. All candidates submitted their pre-final draft by the end of March 2025. The Committee appointed reviewers to review the drafts. 12 BINDERY SECTION

During the year under review, a total of 1,757 books were completely bound in the Book Binding Department. This was apart from the routine work of stitching and pinning 4,344 newspapers, made 36 boxes; repairing books and files, pasting, packing and parcelling; and also made leather folders for the Honorary Fellowship/Medals function.

Besides this, a total of 12 Times of India (Year 2011) newspaper files were pasted and bound; 119 periodicals were bound and gold embossed; Membership forms (in 30 volumes) were bound and gold embossed; and 18 minutes books and rare books of the Society were leather bound and gold embossed.

13. FINANCES

The Asiatic Society of Mumbai was established on 26th November 1804, by Sir James Mackintosh for the promotion of higher education and research. The Society has been partly funded by the Government of India, Ministry of Culture, Government of Maharashtra, Department of Higher and Technical Education, and Municipal Corporation of Greater Mumbai. The Society's own sources of income are interest and dividends from Corpus and Reserve Fund investments, general donations, earmarked donations, membership subscriptions, fines on books and periodicals, income from miscellaneous items like sale of publications, journals, souvenirs, etc. However, the financial position of the Society is quite precarious due to limited sources of income, decline in interest rates, and increasing recurring expenditure.

The Society has approached Government of India, Ministry of Culture for a one-time Corpus Grant of Rs.30 Crore (out of which we have received Rs.5 Crore) and Government of Maharashtra, Department of Higher and Technical Education for a one-time Corpus grant of Rs.20 Crore, as recommended by the Review Committee, appointed by the Ministry of Culture, Government of India. However, a positive response is awaited.

During the year, the Society succeeded in receiving the sanctioned annual recurring grant of Rs.1 Crore from Government of Maharashtra, Department of Higher and Technical Education & Rs. 75 Lakhs from the BMC.

The Society has also requested both the Central and the State Government to increase its Grant by Rs.1 Crore to run the Society efficiently.

The Review Committee appointed by the Ministry of Culture, Government of India, has noted the historic significance of the Society and stated that the Asiatic Society of Mumbai deserves to be designated as an "Institutional of National Importance", while ensuring its autonomy over planning and financing of expenditure and management.

The Society is intensifying its efforts for donations from philanthropists, corporate houses, endowments, CSR funds, etc. for overall maintenance and development of the Society.

14. ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

We appreciate the financial assistance received from the Ministry of Culture, New Delhi, in the form an annual grant of Rs. One crore.

The Hon'ble Governor of Maharashtra and Chief Patron of the Society, Shri C. P. Radhakrishnan for support to the Asiatic Society of Mumbai.

We are thankful to the Government of Maharashtra for acceding to our appeal for financial aid in managing the affairs of the Society, and for agreeing to a recurring annual grant of Rupees One crore from the financial year 2024-2025.
